



Wow. Now this is a real work of art. The History Of Men's Magazines is an extremely colourful and graphic-laden collection of images and information exploring images of women in a variety of publications from 1900 onward. The book itself is an enormous hardback tome, with many pages dedicated to striking

single images such as magazine covers from French Follies or Real Screen Fun. There's also a large amount of (multi-lingual) text-based information about the publications and the perceptions of sex and nudity at the time, and it makes for a fascinating collection either from the point of view that it's an education into the history of porn, or simply as a gallery of gaudy images.



Volume 2 of The History Of Men's Magazines follows on where its predecessor left off, following adult imagery from post-war to 1959. It amusingly deals in the way that naughty images were often passed off as being of either photographic or naturist (and hence scientific) interest, while also

showing the way the comic-book image of the female form developed over time. The two volumes together are a considerable vault of images and information, and this should be a very easy sale to any customer who bought and enjoyed Volume 1.
